BLACK TOT DAY

'Happy Black Tot Day' – an oxymoron if ever there was one! As most of our readers of a certain vintage will know, today marks the 53^{rd} anniversary of the abolition of the daily



issue of a free tot of rum to sailors to Royal Naval personnel. In the early 17th century, sailors at sea were given an allowance of eight pints of beer per day (albeit slightly weaker than today's beers). Beer does not keep though and for longer voyages, the ration was supplemented or replaced by wine (a pint) or spirit (usually Brandy and half a pint). In 1655, following the capture of Jamaica, Admiral Penn introduced rum which replaced Brandy as the spirit of choice as it was readily available and kept better. In 1731, the issue of rum was formally established as a daily allowance, with a quarter pint being issued both in the morning and in the evening (half a pint a day in total). In 1740, Admiral Vernon issued an order that the rum issue should be diluted with water and the subsequent mix was known as Grog after the Grogram coat that Vernon favoured. Following governmental debate, which included such reasons as the effect on drink

driving alongside the inability to operate machinery effectively, the tot was abolished on July 31st 1970 – now known as Black Tot Day. There are many references to Black Tot day on the internet, but <u>this one</u> gives an interesting account of that final day!
